Diverse business and entertainment options	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Lanes and side streets are upgraded as both destinations and thoroughfares</li> <li>• Greater diversity of businesses and entertainment options</li> <li>• Barriers to putting empty properties to use are identified and overcome</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Explore new ideas to activate the city's public spaces, including streets, pathways, parks, public squares, and buildings</li> <li>• Encourage more arts and live music events in the early to late evening</li> <li>• Encourage more retail, coffee shops and restaurants to stay open later in the evening</li> <li>• Start designing upgrades to turn Bank and Blyth streets into lively destinations</li> </ul>
Exemplary venue management and compliance	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Inspection of venues shows better compliance with laws and licensing conditions</li> <li>• Venue licensees have an improved understanding of their obligations under the <i>Liquor Licensing Act 1997</i> and <i>Codes of Practice</i></li> <li>• Consider an 'exemplary' venues award system like the UK's 'Purple Flag' system that recognises excellence in venue and entertainment centre management</li> <li>• Improvements in cleanliness and amenity in public areas</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Use existing data about complaints or non-compliance to improve the efficiency of inspections</li> <li>• Monitor changes to Liquor Licensing legislation</li> <li>• Monitor the current review of the Codes of Practice for licensed premises</li> <li>• Consider an exemplary venues award system, such as Purple Flag</li> </ul>
Community policing and mutually supportive police services / Culturally and socially inclusive care and safety	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Better integration of services (eg police, social services, etc) over peak times to support vulnerable people</li> <li>• A more coordinated approach to health, housing support and dispersal options for vulnerable people</li> <li>• More time available for policing duties by improving the way Police work with social service providers</li> <li>• Resource 'hot spots' as required</li> <li>• Better use of intelligence and technology to help identify, apprehend and prosecute offenders</li> <li>• Reduced number of drunken people locked up by improving the integration of police activities with social services, diversionary programs and other support options.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Coordination of Government and non Government agencies to:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Reduce police time spent on administrative functions and non-policing activities by implementing a new, collaborative model for policing the CBD</li> <li>• Increase the number and capacity of 'safe places' for intoxicated people to sober up</li> <li>• Increase the enforcement of the Public Intoxication Act</li> <li>• Run the 'Street to Home' program by coordinating complementary services better</li> <li>• Review and consolidate street patrols to interact with, and remove young / intoxicated / vulnerable people for their safety</li> <li>• Closer communication between police and community services</li> <li>• Identify current services and identify where there are gaps in service provision</li> <li>• Introduce dedicated all night monitoring of CCTV on Saturday nights</li> </ul> <p><b>Regulation in the CBD:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Increase the skills and knowledge of licensing legislation in police, operational planning officers and other relevant people</li> <li>• Conduct a series of police operations specifically targeting street crime</li> <li>• Conduct police operations in the CBD targeting repeat offenders and premises</li> </ul>
Promotion of Responsible Alcohol Consumption	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Decrease acceptance of the excessive drinking culture and anti social behaviour</li> <li>• The community understand the difference between social drinking and the dangers of drinking too much</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Monitor the policies and practices of licensed venues and offer educational support to improve safety for their clients</li> <li>• Enforce liquor licensing laws more strenuously</li> <li>• Signpost entry points to entertainment precincts advising Adelaide's street and squares are dry areas</li> <li>• Investigate conducting a long term education campaign regarding excessive drinking to begin changing attitudes</li> <li>• Encourage reporting of offences</li> </ul>
